
Larry Hall posing in the middle of an ancient temple in Angkor, Indonesia. The ficus roots are embedded in the walls over hundreds of years.

This year our records show there were 600+ guests who attended our AABS bonsai show. Friday was tree check in day and the day was mostly spent preparing for the display of the 100+ bonsai trees and viewing stones checked in and arrangement of the presentation room.

Jack Wikle and Cyrl Crum directed the display with their vast expertise. Many hands helped to bring in trees from the check in area per direction of master setter upper Jack Wikle. Special thanks to Larry Hall who arrived early Friday to set up the tables among other things.

Vendors started arriving at 2 pm and by 7 pm they were all set up in the multiple rooms at MBG.

At the end of the day there was great anticipation in the air, everybody was tired but very happy looking at our results. The trees were staged knowledgeably to allow a continued flow through out the set. Every single tree was carefully placed to harmonize with the rest of the bonsai around.

Saturday morning John Parks organized a three ring circus. Bill Heston, Alfonso Tercero and John Parks worked on 3 ficus too little trees for the demo. People attending the show quickly filled in the demo area. The "Three Amigos" worked on their tree giving ample explanations of what techniques they were applying to their trees. From selecting the best angle for the front, to removing unnecessary branches to wiring and repotting.

At the end of the demo they raffled each tree among the public attending the session. It was an interesting show and the public benefited from having three experts working side by side. There were many questions and the public was able to immediately buy some trees after the show from the on-site vendors to start their way in their new hobby.

Every visitor was asked to fill in a note with their favorite tree's number to vote for the "People's Choice" tree and received information about how to become a member of the AABS club.

Sunday's afternoon Connie Crancer provided a demonstration to a goodly number of people. Everybody eulogized Connie's ability to convey the basic techniques in a franc and easy to understand manner.

The show closed at 4pm (or so). Everyone promptly picked up their trees and helped to remove stands / tables and to dissemble the set up.

We could not have completed the show without the participation of so many people who brought in trees, choreographing and planning, participated in the show, referred the show to friends and family, brought in food to share, helped to dissemble the tables, the Matthaei Botanical Gardens, etc. THANK YOU!!!



SUISEKI – VIEWING STONES Scholar's Rocks – Sharing a passion

I have a very small collection of Japanese Kamogawaishi viewing stones. The stones (7" X 4" X 4" typically), (rest of a Daiza), (one has a storage Kiri Box) and all are representative of mountains with waterfall and mountains only. The stones I have are all natural with no human enhancement.

I also like bonsai to be natural as found in nature and fine the correlation to natural stones very appealing. I found many photos at our last AABS club meeting to be extremely interesting. You can not out do Mother Nature.

I very much like this aspect of bonsai and wonder if there are others in the club who also have viewing stones and would the club like to have a meeting about these objects.

A magnificent example of Suiseki Art. This rock suggests a mountain in an aesthetically pleasing shape and texture.


Following is an article regarding this wonderful branch or art.

Suiseki, also known as "viewing stones," are stones that suggest mountains, lakes, waterfalls and other natural scenes or that are aesthetically pleasing in shape and texture. They have been associated with bonsai in Japan for at least six hundred years, presumably because both Suiseki and bonsai represent nature in the palm of your hand


Much lore has developed around Suiseki. There are organizations and periodicals devoted to the subject. There are styles: "mountain view," "island shape," "lake and waterfall," "chrysanthemum," "hill and slope" and so forth.

Features that characterize the most pleasing stones have been identified and named. A particularly fine stone may be accompanied by a script telling its provenance.




Top View

In Japan, there is one cardinal rule: suiseki must remain just as rivers, glaciers, or other natural forces shaped them. They must not be touched up by human


hands. But in China, where collecting and displaying viewing stones goes even further back in time, the rule does not apply.


Chinese practitioners have made a separate craft out of cutting and joining stones to produce huge and fantastic creations.

Suiseki are displayed either with bonsai (as a substitute for an accent plant) or standing alone.

In either case the stone can be placed in a tray with sand or water or in a close fitting wooden base (which the Japanese call a "dai").


As in the case of the stones, much lore has developed around these bases, and designing and making them is a demanding branch of wood carving.



TREE COLLECTING OPPORTUNITY Yew Trees ~ Limited availability

The owner of a wooded lot in Ann Arbor plans to remove all non native plants from his property by October 1st and has extended a cordial invitation to members of our club to collect the trees. There are several old yew with trunk diameters of 8 to 12 inches.

There is little foliage close to the trunk. These trees would require a huge effort to dig, and in time could be candidates for bonsai. If they were dug they would have to be grown in a large container for several years before any work could be done on them...a lot of work and time for a long shot.

There are also some small yews that probably came up from seed. Their trunk diameters are about ½ to ¾ inches in diameter. These should be easier to collect.
