June Monthly Meeting

Jim Doyle joined the AABS for a lecture on literati (akabunjin) and a workshop the following day. During the meeting Jim summarized the history of literati and shared his thoughts on the subject. Jim brought two trees to use as props to explain concepts of literati.

Jim explained that literati or bunjin is difficult to explain or describe. Literati can exhibit a provocative design and personality. Like bonsai, literati has no rules, but they do have parameters. Some of these parameters include,

- Branches are found in the upper third of the tree and exhibit the barest amount of foliage
- Inspiration for literati is observed in trees found in your world experiences
- Branches can cross the trunk line
- Containers for the literati are critical in the disign
- Literati can be a conifer or a deciduous tree
- Literati can be designed in the form of a forest or cascade

Advancing In Bonsai . . . Moving From Bonsai As A Hobby To Bonsai As An Art Form

How does someone become knowledgeable in the Field of Bonsai? Yes, many years of trial and error with bonsai trees plays a part. A beginner can also read all the books and try the many styles. But I have found that the best way is through club meetings, Bonsai shows, Bonsai Seminars and Bonsai workshops. Learning the Art of Bonsai by watching and listening to others who have a mastery of this Art seems the best way to me. Sure a lot of the information can be repetitive, but this is when the learner can also be a teacher by adding personal experience to the conversation. That's how it starts - someone sharing their knowledge and opening up to others who also want to share.

Recently Paul Kulesa and I went to Rochester, New York. We spent four days immersed in the Art of Bonsai. We each spent a total of 22 hours listening to and watching 7 top Bonsai Artists. 7 top Bonsai Artists all in the same place for 4 days of lectures, demonstrations, and open discussions. This does not happen every day. There was dozens of Specimen Bonsai trees to view and discuss and there were 75 registered participants who shared the experience. If only there had been One Hundred and

Seventy Five, Two Hundred and Seventy Five. The information flowing there was beyond any book one could read

Ryan Neil, Kathy Shaner, Denis Makishima, Peter Warren, Bill Valavanis, David DeGroot, Kora Dalager: If you had met and worked with these people you too would have felt the bonsai part of your brain form new connections and take a giant step forward in the Art of Bonsai.

All of us need to take every workshop offered and attend every Bonsai function that we can. Only in this way will we advance our Bonsai proficiency. This Art of Bonsai is changing every day; every year as more and more of us are becoming immersed in it. Yes, workshops cost money, traveling to them costs money. But if we spent more on learning and less on that 'gotta have tree' we might be able to enjoy this Art to a higher level, and our trees would live longer and get more accolades.


