JANUARY MEETING Cat Nelson Discusses Bonsai Pottery

Snow and ice conspired to clog the roadways preventing an overflow of members at the January meeting. The 15 members who braved the trip to Matthaei were treated to a look into the world of bonsai

pottery. Prior to the meeting, six members shared a meal with Cat, welcoming her back to Ann Arbor.

BONSAI POTTERY – BY CAT NELSON

Bonsai pottery is made of a variety of materials that dictates use and value. The quality of the tree is often reflected in the value of the pottery.

- Plastic pottery are valued and designed for training bonsai material but compromises the heath of the root systems due to heat build-up and poor aeration of the soil mass.
- Mica pottery, currently produced in Korea, are great for bonsai training and possess an effective insulating characteristic.
- Chinese pottery available at value prices and are attractive. They can be used to display your bonsai but often do not survive freeze damage due to low-fired ceramics.
- High-fired ceramic pottery are often designed for display, they will survive freezing and their price reflects this use.

• Slabs are often of questionable quality due to the production methods and design.



- know what the pottery is made of
- where it came from?
- is it new, previously used or antique?
- are there lime deposits or cracks or chips?

The cost of pottery is a subjective measurement reflecting your perceived value of the pottery. A buyer should beware.

- Slip-mold produced pottery are generally of lower quality showing no production details on the bottom of the pot other than a sticky label (made in...).
- High fired/high values pottery can be sourced from anywhere in the world and are often handmade.
- Pottery identified as antique, can only be from China and Japan at this time, these countries are the only long time producers of quality pottery preserved over long period of time.

There are several characteristics that demonstrate the age and value of the pottery. Patina, often seen as a soiled surface, repairs made with pewter and custommade display boxes are often seen with antique pottery. Again, buyers beware.

Much of what Cat Nelson told us about linking a bonsai to a bonsai pottery can be summarized.

- The width of the base of the trunk can be equal to or less than the depth of the pottery.
- A pottery can appear too massive for the bonsai it holds.
- In broad terms, the width of the pottery should equal 2/3 the width of the canopy.
- A shallow tray-like pottery can be longer than the width of the canopy.
- Be aware that pottery can be too wide of a bonsai.
- Avoid pottery and a bonsai canopy that are the same width.

When linking the color of the pottery to a bonsai, it is important to understand that having the eye of the viewer drawn to the bonsai is most important. The goal of choosing a color is to compliment the tree or an attribute of the bonsai. The pottery should not upstage the bonsai.

Both bonsai and their pottery can be viewed as having feminine or masculine characteristics. Feminine characteristics include gentle curves and soft lines, while masculine characteristics include corners, sharp angles and a massive appearance.

In broad terms, there are several issues to consider. When choosing bonsai pottery . . .

- consider the movement of the branches and foliage.
- consider the texture of the bonsai (trunk, branching and foliage) and the pottery.
- consider a pattern that is found on the pottery that may compliment the bonsai.
- consider the age of the bonsai and the pottery, the age of the bonsai should be greater than the age of the pottery.

In general terms. Pottery is classified by two characteristics, shape and glaze (can be unglazed, glazed and natural).

A formal display system, Gadou Display, developed by a Japanese bonsai artist (Ichiu Yamamoto is the founder of Gadou), can be explored for the formal aspects of displaying bonsai.
