January 27th meeting – Andrew Robson to present Fall/Winter Deciduous Work

The first meeting of the year will take place Wednesday, January 27th beginning at 6:30 on Zoom with a half-hour informal chat. The formal meeting will begin at 7:00 with Andrew Robson presenting "Fall/Winter Deciduous Work". This will be a Powerpoint presentation followed by a Q&A.

Winter is the best season for deciduous study. After leaf drop in autumn is the optimal time to access where a deciduous bonsai is and where it needs to go with its development and maintenance. While most deciduous bonsai work happens in the growing season, most deciduous bonsai analysis happens in winter silhouette. This presentation gives strategies for how to study our deciduous bonsai in winter, how to access where they are and where they need to go. Additionally, we'll study deciduous bonsai aesthetics, the different forms, and combinations of branch patterns, and the differences between trees, shrubs, styles, and approaches. As always, we'll conclude with a deciduous bonsai Q&A.

Andrew Robson is an emerging deciduous artist in the American bonsai community. Andrew recently completed a 3-year apprenticeship with Michael Hagedorn, after graduating from Yale University. Andrew serves as a member of the Portland Bonsai Village, and has previously served as a board member of the American Bonsai Society. He currently exhibits work at the Portland Japanese Garden, and regularly lectures at the garden's Japanese Arts Learning Center. Andrew and his family are currently building a deciduous-focused bonsai garden, school, and nursery, RAKUYO-en, just outside of Portland, Oregon. While some conifers hang around RAKUYO, the overwhelming focus is on deciduous bonsai.

Notes from October's meeting Chris Kehrig

AABS Elections and Winter Storage discussions

Election for board members and Zoom coordinator went through 100%

9 different winter set ups were discussed: **Ron**:

- 8 x 12 plexiglass greenhouse purchased online from Costco for \$600
- Keeps 6 inches of sand on the bottom with low in ground heating
- All trees go on the ground in the sand

- Mainly used to keep pests out of trees
- Still fairly new to Ron = Jack suggested painting the window pains to reduce heat

Mark:

- Started with a 20 x 48 hoop house that some length has been removed
- Used to be topped with visqueen, but the cats shredded it
- Length went down to 32 feet with polycarbonate panels
- Big Max propane heater set at 32 degrees for heat and 50 for vent fan
- Larger pots go on the ground and smaller on the shelves **Bob**:
- His inspiration came from Hidden Lake Gardens
- 8 x 8 box with Styrofoam enclosure around the border to close off within pull barn
- Peat goes in the bottom with trees tucked into

Jay:

- Straw bails get stacked up 2 bails high to create an enclosure
- Peat fills in the middle for trees to tuck into
- Boards go on top to close off

- Traps set up for critters, but has not been a problem Ken:

- Was not online to narrate
- Large hoop houses covered with milky plastic over them **Dana**:
- 4 different areas used per tree type
- The tropicals are inside with a fan/humidifier/and light for 4x4 area
- Lights are set up for 14 hours on / 10 hours off
- The hardier trees are in the garage and kept at 40-45 degrees
- John:
- Cold frames started with 4 and down to 3
- Wood construction with opaque plexiglass doors on front facing north
- Floor is sand and wire
- Insulated around with oak leaves

Justin:

- Outdoors, tucked into 3 corner area of house facing south
- Board in place to hold in mulch and leaves
- Chris:
- Indoor trees brought into 4 season room off back of the house
- Moderate trees Alzalea and Redwoods are in the attached garage
- Outdoor trees lined outside along north east corner of garage with mulch and leaves
