May Meeting Minutes Chris Kehrig

Next month will be refreshments and goodies in the bonsai house

July is bring your own bonsai tree or possible speaker

Scott Zomerlie from Growco in Grand Rapids presented pests and fertilizers

Fertilizer is added to soil to increase to soil to increase crops

Fertility of plants:

- Lush green growth
- Strong stems and branches
- Flowers
- Fruit sets and seeds
- Ample bud development

Healthy plants on a cellular level:

- Roots/stems/leaves
- Energy storage
- Cell walls
- Absorption of water/food

NPK:

Nitrogen – Green/creating new cells/stem and leaf growth Phosphorus – Root and flower growth Potassium – Water uptake, fruit, and flower development

Synthetic vs Organic

Synthetic feeds plants directly, fast acting, quick vigor, can burn quickly

Organic feeds the soil, must be broken down, slow release, harder to burn, feeds over longer period, and micronutrients

Soil and fertilizer PH

PH runs from 1 – 14 with 1 being acidic and 14 alkaline

Alkaline:

Barberry, Beech, Boxwood, Cotoneaster, Lilacs, and Hawthorne

Acidic:

Azaleas, Birch, Fir, Hemlock, Holly

Peat, pine bark, or kanuma can be added to soil mix for acidity

Time to fertilize:

Spring: Temps above 40 degrees / start with extra nitrogen

Summer: More balanced / avoid chemicals with hottest temps

Fall: Lower nitrogen, increase phosphorus and potassium / foliar spray can green quickly

Mark Fields and azalea care:

April - Dyna grow

May – fish emulsion

June - organic cakes

July – same as May

August – same as July

Sept/Oct - 0/10/10

Watering:

- Kills more trees than anything
- Good time to observe trees
- Shallow vs deep pots
- Exposed surface area
- Root bound or freshly repotted
- Moss
- Pruning or defoliating
- Placement shade or sun

Pests:

- Altering surrounding
- Adding insects/organisms
- Growing resistant plants
- Neem oil
- Azaguard or Azamax

Pesticides/fungicides as last defense

IPM = Integrated Pest Management

- 1. Identify and monitor
- 2. Evaluate
- 3. Prevent
- 4. Action
- 5. Monitor

Sucking insects like aphides, scale, and mealy bugs = honeydew which brings ants

Best pesticides: Systematic can flow through but takes time for complete protection. Spectracide, Bonida, and soap can clog bugs breathing.

Fungus is harder to notice which Is dark brown or black spots – Infuse, mangozeb, clearys

Use caution when using sprays – mask / protective clothing, check the weather. Avoid neem oil on spruces.
