Will Baddeley – Deadwood Carving

Will Baddeley will give a presentation of techniques and examples of deadwood carving of bonsai.

The following was culled from bonasiempire.com.

"As long as I remember, I have always had a huge appreciation of nature. M love affair with trees was there long before I came across Bonsai.

My main interest in Bonsai is working with our native European tree species and also in creating natural looking deadwood on deciduous trees with the use of power tools and scalpels.

I am self taught, if there is such a thing. Observant and committed would be another way of putting it as I soak up information like a sponge. My main influences have come from the likes of Colin Lewis and his passion for natives and in particular Ulmus minor. Also, Kevin Willson and his work with wild material and deadwood work with power tools."

4 new members in attendance

Mike Lane presented via Zoom Tiny Trees Huge Impact

Mike has been doing bonsai for 15 years

Shonin is the Japanese word for tiny things

Shonin trees are 8-10" / Mame trees are ${\sim}4$ " and can be held in one hand

Interest in Shonin didn't begin until the 60's and in the west during the 70's

Count Yorinaga is the father of Shonin bonsai and started the Gafuten Japanese annual show

<u>Pros of small bonsai:</u> Take less space Easy to move Fast development Less likely to overwater

<u>Cons of small bonsai:</u> More delicate Lack prominence of larger trees Branch placement can be an issue Dry out fast

<u>Suitable material:</u> Air layers Cuttings Small/young nursery stock Small leaves such as Elms or Boxwoods Seasonal color/fruiting/flowers

<u>Rule of threes:</u> Bottom, middle, and top The bottom is devoid of branches The middle is the framing of the front

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Top provides the apex

Development phase – larger pot / coarse based soil including Akadama

No rush for finished container Tree should be built first Cut paste should be used Let 2 branches grow around wound to heal

The Japanese respect longevity of trees and will pay \$\$ for older trees

Silhouette pruning will provide quick shape but doesn't concentrate on strong branches

Don't modify the tree after first purchasing

When wiring, Mike will wire and then bend a little more every week

Design is always evolving

Convincing Shonin: Fewer branches Strong taper 6:1 Informal and cascade

<u>Containers:</u> Drainage is most important Bright colors Harmony to tree Painted pots Can be experimental

<u>Display:</u> 2 or more trees Pine on top like a mountain Deciduous lower Different species and shapes Pots should be different

High nitrogen fertilizer during the development stage and 5-5-5 during refinement

As you are bringing out your trees from their winter hibernation, begin to think about which trees you might want to put in the AABS show August 26th-27th, 2023.

Picking out the trees now allows time to provide that extra attention needed to get your trees show ready.

Spring is the perfect time to repot that show tree in a nice ceramic pot. Fertilize them now and throughout the growing season to have beautiful healthy foliage growth. Fungicide your outdoor trees in Spring and as needed throughout the season. Think about wiring your trees, or removing old wire to prevent wire scars. If repotting your tree into the same pot, clean the pot very well, which is much easier if the tree is out of the pot.

I would love to see every member of AABS get involved in the show somehow. It is a great way to learn more about bonsai and meet other club members. You could help with set up or tear down of the show. We need people to greet visitors and take money at the entrance. Lastly, put at least one tree in the show. We want to display trees from beginner bonsai artists to expert bonsai artists.
